Boating Safety

On March 10, 2013, the Safety Committee will offer a program of the SC DNE approved Boater Safety Education Course. SC law requires that any person under the age of 16 who operates any motorized vessel with more than 15 hp, without having an adult on board the vessel (includes jet skis), must have successfully completed a SC DNR or SC DNR-approved Boater Safety Education Course and must have proof of completion of the course. The course will be taught by a SCDNR certified instructor.

In addition to the SC law requirement for those under 16 years of age, most insurance companies give a discount on insurance if <u>all</u> the operators of any insured boat have successfully completed this course.

The course is free, the printed book is free. You will need to bring 2 #2 pencils to take the required exam at the end which is open book. The course will run from 1000 to 1700 with a lunch break. Lunch is also free and provided by Teddy Marett.

Help Needed

WCSC has club members working more than the ten hours of Fair Share required each year. Several of our members worked over a hundred hours each, not just last year but many times. What some club members do not know is that WCSC Rules and Regulations states "All boats and other equipment stored on Club property shall be maintained in a safe condition and reasonably good appearance". To me that means you should clean and use it at least once a year. If you have a tree growing in the cockpit of your boat, you probably have not done this in a couple of years and should not sound despondent when a Club Officer notices and takes the time to call you. Each member should cut the grass under and around any property you have stored at WCSC. If you have a flat tire and cannot move your boat you need to spend some time maintaining your property or you may lose the privilege (it's not a right) to keep things stored at WCSC.

Each WCSC club member is required to pay your dues on time and, if necessary, explain any discrepancy in your bill. The \$10 fine for being late is extra work for Mary Ann Caldwell, who has been doing this for over twenty years. To help her out, add up your total bill (add in any fair share if you know you will not be able to do your ten hours) for the year and pay that the first quarter. That would help Mary Ann, the sailing club (we could start projects earlier) and you would have three less bills to pay the rest of the year. I did this myself for a couple of years. Each member has at least one day of serving on Race Committee and some members volunteer more than one day. Also, you are required to work *ten hours* of Fair Share each year and *five hours* are needed to be filled before June 30th of each year.

Mainly, aim to keep things better than you do at home. If each member did what they are supposed to do then other club members would have a lot less work. As Dan would say "Do I need to get your Mother to tell you what to do?"

US Sailing Race Management Course

You should attend the course if...

...you are a PRO that is scheduled to run a club race, a Regatta or any other club race event in 2013. If you have not attended a Race Management course in the last

couple years, you need to renew your US Sailing race certification to qualify for your Fair Share hours.

Attending the course will keep you up to date with recent changes and will familiarize you with the basics of US Sailing Race Management

...you are a racer and want to better understand the mechanics and details of running a race. This course will go thru all the details you need to completely understand flags, starts, course setup, course changes, etc.

...you are assigned to a race committee for WCSC in 2013. This is a good way to understand the details of basic race management and provide educated help to your PRO to run successful races

Keelboat Fleet

The Keelboat fleet had an active racing season in the fall. We completed 13 of 18 scheduled races with an average of 4.1 boats competing in A class and 4.6 in the B class. Unfortunately, lack of wind resulted in 5 of the races not being started. The most boats participated in the races on September 29 with a total of 11 boats (7 in A class and 4 in the B class).

The top results in the A class were:

Marc Bailey, sailing his Melges 24 *Screaming Mimi* took 1st place in the season with all 1st place finishes except for one 3rd.

Brian Hampton, sailing his Star *Rondori*, finished 2nd for the first time. For some reason, Brian has now sold this boat...

Close behind Brian was your author sailing J/24 *Cahoots* in 3rd place.

The top results in the B class were:

Perennial winner Dick Harder was 1st sailing his Lindenburg 22 *Lucky Lindy*.

Perennial bridesmaid Mike Harrison finished 2nd sailing his Catalina 22 *Old Yeller*.

Newcomer Craig Lenfestey was close behind in 3rd sailing his Catalina 22 *Cattitude*.

Rick Fontenot joined us for a number of races sailing his Corsair 24 Trimaran *Cowardly Lion*. In one race, Rick finished first over the A class boats. Unfortunately, the *Cowardly Lion* lacks a keel so it is ineligible to be scored in the series but we enjoyed Rick's company on the race course and afterward.

Following the competitors' meeting on 3 race days, we had a review of the rules applicable at the start, the windward mark, and the leeward mark for those who wished to participate.

Our 2013 Spring Series of six race days begins March

3rd. Each race day, 3 races are scheduled with an intended duration of 45 minutes each. We meet in the clubhouse for lunch at 1100 (\$4 to \$5 donation per person expected). At 1130, we have the competitors' meeting and discuss the plans for the day. The warning signal for the first race is planned for 1300 with the other two races following ASAP. No race will be started after 1630. After the races, we gather at the "Tiki Bar" (at the head of D dock) for snacks, refreshments, scores, and "stories."

Our fleet by-laws and sailing instructions can be found on the club website under "Club Documentation, Keelboat Fleet Documentation." We sail under US Sailing's Performance Handicap Racing Formula (PHRF) where inherently faster boats (based on design, not skill) are handicapped against those that are not so fast.

If you have any interest in racing, our fleet is a great way to get started. The racing is generally low-key with a minimum of "discussion" on the water. If you would like to get started as a crew member, please let me know in advance of a race day and I'll try to find you a ride.


