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

spell' with regards to historic rainfall levels. From the Corps of Engineers Lake Hartwell 'Balancing the Basin' webpage:

> "November is typically the second driest month of the year for the basin (with October being the driest), but last month was dry even in relative terms. Hartwell collected a mere 0.81 inches - the lowest for November since records have been kept (1948). That is an excruciatingly small amount considering we're still recovering from the drought and that Hartwell averages 4.52 inches in November."

> Hopefully we will receive sufficient rainfall in the spring of 2018 to replenish our second home! In the meantime, dock captains, slip and mooring occupants need to monitor the lake levels on a regular basis. Dock cables need to be adjusted, mooring scopes need to be checked and adjusted. If you're on a mooring and the lake level continues to drop, that means your boat can swing closer to 'skinny water' and wind up grounded. On a more positive note, if the lake level rises, you will need to make sure you increase the scope on your mooring so your boat doesn't sink due the mooring line becoming too taut.

Winter and then spring weather is going to be on us. Big winds, cold temperatures – this is not a time to neglect your boat. Visit your boat regularly, check the lines and the chafing gear. It is your responsibility to keep it secured. If it breaks loose, you are responsible for the damage it causes to other boats. Offer to help your dock captain if he needs assistance adjusting your dock. If we do not get some substantial and sustained rainfall, the lake levels will continue to fall and further action will be required of all of us.

Custom Steel arrived in December and took care of the maintenance/repair we'd been needing for some time, including the replacement of bad floatation on a couple of docks, and welding repairs on C and E Docks. They also installed the new extension on the



main launch ramp, which Ronnie and Joe Rose spent a lot of time designing. We should now have at least a +/- 2 foot lake level variance before the ramp needs to be moved. In addition, that steep ramp to the dock has remedied. The North Launch Ramp dock continues to present us with maintenance challenges in both high and low water conditions. We have a plan of modifications to the dock that will hopefully make it a more viable asset to maintain.

One last item: please take the time to update your personal information on the club's website. We do our best to keep you informed through not only the club's web-based calendar, but also weekly email reminders. Many of you have non-operational email addresses and/or out of date phone numbers on file. If you can't access the website, due to changing computers or phones, or have forgotten your password or UserID, please let us know and we'll provide assistance with

the login information you need and then you can update your information!

As always, if you see a maintenance need, have a "somebody/they should fix that thought", want to volunteer to do a project on your own time/ schedule, or feel you need to express other concerns that fall within the "water based" arena, please let the appropriate committee chairman and me know. 1968 Protecting the Investment

The Peninsula

In October of 1967, Bob Stewart, as Chair of the Long Range Planning Committee, sent a letter to the Corps requesting that the area across the cove be designated for use by a sailing club, the same stipulation that was placed on the original WCSC lease. That area would become known as the "peninsula." Stewart explained that the club had grown so rapidly that the board expected the area would be needed within five years. He further explained that if the 410 acre Webb Farm adjacent to that Corps tract was sold and the tract was leased for benefit of a development, there could be a conflict of purposes causing harm to the club such that it could no longer function. Senator Strom Thurmond and Representative Bryan Dorn were copied with the letter since they had shown special interest in the club acquiring the original lease.

This initiated a series of correspondence between Bob Stewart, Colonel Barnes and Colonel Max McCord of the Corps, Senator Thurmond and Representative Dorn. It began with the Corps stating that the tract could not be designated for sailing only but it was available for lease, and recommending that the club begin the leasing process as soon as possible. Bob then informed the Corps that the club was not in a financial position for that but would be in about five more years. The Corps was adamant that the tract could not be set aside for a future use, with the justification of leaving it available for other possible lessees to compete, at which time the club would be given the same opportunity as all others. By mid-November, Bob instructed Col. Barnes to proceed with plans to amend the current lease to include the peninsula. The assumption was made that Bob had reviewed this with the board and approval had been given with budgeting to be worked out later.

On November 24, Col. Barnes informed Bob that unknown to him at the time, there were other interests in the property and that the Corps, in order to be fair to all parties, must advertise the property and WCSC would have an equal opportunity with other interested parties to lease the tract.

On December 13, Bob composed a letter with a firm plea to Col. Barnes asking for the Corps to consider the club's position. He explained how surprised the club leaders were that the Corps had backed off on a commitment to lease. He further requested the Corps advertise the property as soon as possible and asked for the name of the party who would be competing with the club for the property. To support the club's position he explained that the island has been improved at considerable expense to WCSC. He explained that the island was developed in a fashion that made the whole area attractive for other interests and it would be unfair to allow a developer to take advantage of the improvements. Additionally, he reminded them that the club brought to Lake Hartwell a sport that is growing rapidly nationally and the club facilities are clearly superior to anything in the area. On the same day Bob sent a letter to Rep. Dorn, attaching a copy of his letter to Col. Barnes, reminding Dorn of his earlier offer to be of assistance and stated that Dorn's help was most certainly needed. Rep. Dorn assured Bob of his continued interest and said he was anxious to help.

On December 21, Col. Barnes wrote Bob informing him of the Corps' plans to divide the peninsula into two parcels. One parcel

described as site 124-A would be directly across the cove from the club (which is site 124) and it would be restricted for sailing use, and the other would be site 124-B which would be on the southwesterly side of the peninsula and that it would be for general use. He also gave Bob the name of the other interested party and assured him that an invitation to bid would be released soon and that any club could apply.

So this is how Commodore Tom Bates began his year in 1968. The club received an "Invitation for Application for Leasing" on February 1 and the board formally approved of moving forward to acquire a lease for both sites at a meeting on February 26. The application was submitted in the spring and by July it was in Washington for approval. By September 4 a lease for both sites was approved, pending signature of Secretary of the Army. The rental was \$910 for both sites beginning September 15, 1968 and ending September 14, 1988. A drawing of the original lease (124) and the peninsula (124A and 124B) are shown to the right.



The Peninsula

Throughout the years there have been numerous attempts to develop the sites in order to comply with Corps understanding. Efforts to develop in the area for primitive camping have mostly failed, and during the administration of Commodore John Davis there was a serious attempt to make the area more accessible by constructing a road connecting it with the original club site.

Other Objectives

Another of Commodore Bates's objectives was to initiate a Junior Training Program. He and Art Menke, the program chair, studied several programs in the southeast including the Charleston Yacht Club. They accumulated suggestions from

members of SAYRA and our own club. With Menke serving as Director and assistants Greg Menke (his son) and Billy Spitz (son of Dr. Artie Spitz), the first Junior Sailing Class was held on June 1. Also helping were Tommy and Ann Spitz and a high school student, F. Terhune Sudderth (who to this day works passionately with juniors who are learning to sail). Twenty-one students from ages 9 to 19 were awarded certificates and the program was so successful that plans were immediately made to expand it.

As stated in Commodore Bates's objectives, 1968 was to be "our year for regattas." And so it was. In addition to the WCSC Open Regatta in August, there was scheduled the SAYRA Sears Cup, the Thistle Carolinas District Championship, the AMOS Semi Finals for the ADAMS Cup, and the Southeastern Thistle Inter District Blue Chevron.



WCSC 1968 Junior Sailing Class

On March 8, 1968 a new member by the name of Bill Sloger was accepted; in three years he would become the seventh Commodore of WCSC.

Since the Club was expected to grow in numbers and activity, and as expectations for acquiring the lease on sites 124A and B appeared to be increasingly possible, there were serious concerns about the Club's financial status. During a special meeting on August 12, the members present overwhelmingly voted for a 50% increase in dues and on January 1, 1969 dues increased from \$10 per month to \$15.

This year the flag pole was ordered, installed, and paid for by Mr. Bill Watkins, and conversations began with the Corps about the requirements for the building and managing of floating slip docks.

At the annual meeting which was held at the Club on November 9, the following officers were elected for 1969:


Fall 48 Regatta - LYNC Moorewille, NC

I hope you will indulge me this because it was an awesome experience that I would like to share. The Fall 48 Regatta was held at Lake Norman Yacht Club in Mooresville, NC on November 3 and 4. The event was attended by 30 boats at a great venue. WCSC was represented with two boats: John Kreidler and John Wake on *Comfortably Numb*, Eric Seymour and Danielle Bruce on FS #5177. We were treated on Friday afternoon to a how-to clinic led by our own John Kreidler and Ryan "Mad Sail Maker" Malmgren. They went over boat handling, racing tactics, sail trim, and rig settings. I don't know about anyone else but I sure learned a lot and was able to put a lot of it to good use over the weekend.

Saturday came with an expectation of light winds but we were greeted with a fresh load of sailboat fuel out of the east and it came in abundance. It was a steady blow of 15 gusting over 20 with a one-foot chop on the lake; it made for a spirited day of sailing. The first race sequence started on time at noon. At the sound of the go, 15 boats were fighting for the same piece of real-estate on the start line and too many of them were over early; they had to do a general recall of the fleet for another start. They were able to get the next start off with only two boats over early so we had a race. Two laps with a leeward finish. John Kreidler with John Wake got the bullet on the first race.



The second race was a three-lap race with a leeward finish. The winds were left staying close to the middle of the course. Lynn Bruss with Bill Bruss on *Flying Circus* from Privateer Yacht Club in Tennessee got the bullet on this one. This was the first win in a regatta for Lynn and she was pretty excited about it.



The third race came with a major 90-degree wind shift and a course change before the start. Everyone saw the WL3 on the committee boat at the start of the sequence, but most of us did not see the change to a WL2 with three minutes to go. Several boats, including the leader of the race, rounded the leeward mark a second time instead of going to the finish. Needless to say, they were not happy with the outcome of the race. Steve Shaw with Tim Porter on For Sale (interesting name) from Peninsula Yacht Club took the win on this one.

The fourth and final race on Saturday came with the wind kicking up a couple of knots to a steady 18-20. Many boats retired before the end of the race. It was supposed to be a WL2 but was shortened at the windward mark on the second lap up. This race was like riding a bucking bronco with a heavy chop and high puffy winds. LNYC's own Sean O'Donnell with Dave Rink on *Rhino* got the bullet on this one.

Saturday's dinner party came with lasagna, garlic knots, salad, and dirt cake for dessert. And yes, there were plenty of adult beverages to help us unwind from a spirited day on the water. There was a presentation to the boat builder for 60 years of fine craftsmanship in building the Flying Scot. Tyler Andrews from Flying Scot was there to receive the presentation.

Sunday delivered only one race for the day. The winds were light out of the northeast, a three-lap race was set. On the second run down to leeward the wind laid down. It was like watching paint dry trying to get to the leeward mark. The race was shortened at the weather mark. Steve Shaw with Tim Porter on *For Sale* from Peninsula Yacht Club got a second bullet for this one.

Recycling - It's Baaaccckkk

Many of you have hopefully noticed the neatly organized recycling center in the clubhouse which represents our club's next effort to resurrect a recycling program for our members. I had the pleasure of organizing this program and presented it to the Board in October where it received unanimous approval. As Ronnie Ashmore said, "It's just the right thing to do!" I realize that recycling programs have died off at our club in the past, so the key to success this time is with us, the membership. It is estimated that two thirds of the solid waste material deposited in our landfill in Starr could be recycled.

Landfills around our state are occupying an increasing amount of acreage, irretrievably trashing this land and contributing to the seepage of pollutants into groundwater which ultimately affects our cherished Lake Hartwell. Those of us who love the lake and its surrounding environment therefore have a vested interest in supporting this program.

Keys to the success of our program involve proper sorting and preparation of recyclables and recruiting a small group of dedicated members to support and sustain the program. I have agreed to organize a small committee and Dan Marett has volunteered to assist. We have been given permission to offer "Fair Share" credits for any members who would like to join our committee to reward time spent in supporting this program. To ensure success of our program please follow these simple guidelines:



- 1. Please sort and rinse recyclables as instructed and never deposit garbage in our recyclable containers! This simple step should prevent unpleasant odors and insects.
- 2. We are only able to recycle four items as marked on the four containers:

PLASTICS—only plastic bottles which could be capped (water or soft drink bottles, milk or beverage jugs, cooking or cleaning bottles. Take a minute to empty and rinse prior to deposit, PLEASE!!

GLASS—green, brown, blue, clear wine or beer bottles, jars, etc. Again, please take a minute to empty and rinse before deposit.

METAL—ONLY aluminum or steel cans, beer or soft drink cans, food cans, etc. VERY IMPORTANT to empty and rinse before deposit.

PAPER—Only dry, clean paper such as newspaper, magazines, junk mail, cardboard packaging, etc. No metal or plastic please.

3. Each container will have a plastic liner bag with replacements readily available. If you see that a container is full, please tie off the filled bag and replace it with another. You may then either take the bag to the recycling center yourself or call me for a pickup. I'll try to check by the club often to be sure this is not a problem.



Keelloat Fleet

The Fall, 2017 Keelboat season ended on November 11 with a great distance race lasting 2 to 3 hours. Three boats competed in A Class and two boats competed in the B Class. Two Cruisers also joined us that day. In A Class, Marc Bailey won with his Melges 24, *Screaming Mimi*. Mike Harrison won the B Class with his Catalina 22, *Old Yeller*. Curt Rubenstein won the Cruiser Class with his Catalina 30, *Hang on Sloopy*.

Overall in the Fall Series, we were able to race 12 of the scheduled 16 races and 5 of the 6 scheduled race days. Eight boats competed in the A Class and three raced in the B Class.

Marc Bailey took first place in A class with an average finish of 1.83 and your author took second with an average finish of 1.89. Chuck Ballew (Ultimate 20, *Mischief*) placed third with an average finish position of 2.71. Our incoming Rear Commodore, John Barnard, proved to be someone to watch with a 1st place finish in very strong wind conditions.

In the B Class, Mike Harrison won convincingly with an average finish position of 1.2, while Brian Hampton (Santana 20, *Chubasco*) took second place with an average finish of 1.88.

We had two heavy air race days, one involving the departure of a crew member from *Screaming Mimi*. Fortunately, BJ Leonard was wearing his life jacket and was quickly rescued by the mark boat.

On October 21, the fleet held its annual meeting. Fleet officers for 2018 were elected: Steve Kiemele, Fleet Captain; Marc Bailey, Assistant Fleet Captain; Joe Martin, Treasurer; Margaret Kiemele, Secretary; Mike Harrison, PHRF Chairman and Scorer. Fleet dues remain at \$40 per year. The 2018 Spring season begins on March 4 with a distance race.


The Keelboat Fleet races 12 days per year, 6 days in a spring season from March to June and 6 days in a fall season from September to November. The initial spring and final fall race days are scheduled as distance events around government buoys.

On the other days, 3 races around inflatable marks are scheduled with an intended duration of 45 minutes each. At 11:30 am, we have the competitors' meeting in the main parking lot and discuss the plans for the day. The warning signal for the first race is planned for 1:00 pm with the other two races following ASAP. No race will be started after 4:30 pm. After the races, we gather at the "Tiki Bar" at the head of D dock for snacks, refreshments (adult beverages provided and curated by the Fleet Beverage Consultant), scores, and "stories."

Our fleet by-laws and sailing instructions can be found on the club website under "Club Documentation, Keelboat Fleet Documentation." We sail under US Sailing's Performance Handicap Racing Formula (PHRF) where inherently faster boats (based on design, not skill) are handicapped against those that are not so inherently fast. We sail in two classes-"A" and "B" - with the "A Class" being those with a PHRF rating of 189 or lower and the "B Class" boats having a rating of 190 or higher. Rating adjustments are made for sailing without a spinnaker if desired. Boats kept in the water receive a rating adjustment for that disadvantage too.

If you have any interest in racing, or just improving your sailing skills by comparing your performance with others, our fleet is a great way to get started. The racing is generally low-key with a minimum of "discussion" on the water. If you own a keelboat, come out on a race day and give it a try. If you like it, you can join later.

Admission is \$10 or 10 canned goods per family for the local food bank.


Anyone interested in participating is welcome.
