

We had over 4 feet of rise in lake level over 5 days in February and it wouldn't surprise me to see something like that again. Please let me or the appropriate person know if you need help!

The Centerboard and Keelboat fleets have both started racing for the year and several big regattas are on the horizon. Again, come on out and join us for the festivities! DAM DISTANCE RACE

Welcome to the fifth edition of the 'new and improved' Dam Distance Race. New and Improved again for 2019, as sailing dinghies will be eligible to compete. Traditionally, this race has brought the very casual racers and the non-racers together for a semi-structured sailing experience, not so loose as individual day sailing, but not so formal as Keelboat or Centerboard Fleet racing. The 2019 edition is an attempt to tweak the 'old' distance race concept by leaning a little more towards the 'race' aspect (on the water), and including the all-important post-race party (on shore). We want to provide the fun of friendly competition without the anxieties of the cut-throat sailing often associated with formal racing. And we are going to provide a written guide ("The Beginner's Guide") that will explain to you how to understand, participate in, and hopefully enjoy, this low key race, The Dam Distance Race.



You should notice two distinctions in the event title. First: This is a "distance" event. We plan to have boats out on the lake most of the day. The event starts earlier than most Club races and may continue as late as (on the water) 17:00. Second: This is a "race". The boats will have to correctly start, pass certain government buoys on a specified side of the boat, pass those buoys in a particular order, and finish correctly. Boats will be ranked 1st, 2nd, 3d, and so on. There will be winners and, well..., not winners.

Notwithstanding the previous statement, this race is somewhat different than what the WCSC Keelboat Fleet does. The race organizers (Allison and Rick) are attempting to 'soften' traditional sailboat racing so that novices and non-racers can enjoy competition without the more rigorous aspects of traditional windward/leeward buoy racing. The major difference is the start. It is our belief that the start of a sailboat race is the cause of greatest anxiety for the novice/non-racer. We certainly felt that way when we began racing years ago. I mean, come on, all the boats want to be in the same place at the same time! That can't be what Chapman's calls "seaman-like". Racers can mostly manage this (starting) because they understand (mostly) the somewhat-intricate rules. Cruisers and day sailors are wise to be apprehensive! However, the Dam Distance Race is going to use what is called a pursuit start. Slower boats will start sooner than faster boats. How much sooner is determined by the boat's rating. The organizers will distribute a table that tells each boat at what time they can start. In this manner, the starting line shouldn't be crowded with the entire fleet at the start, as there actually are many starts. In fact, other than two boats having the same rating, each boat will have her own starting time.

There are two additional perks with a pursuit start race. At the end of their race, boats are scored in the order of their finish. If you cross the finish line ahead of another boat, you beat her! You don't have to wait till after the race is over for RC (the Race Committee) to calculate the corrected times. Some may call this instant gratification. Others may call this "I kicked your..." As I was saying, the

KEELBOAT FLEET

The 2019 Spring racing season commenced with a distance race on March 3 with George Masson winning A Fleet with his Ultimate 24. On a day with rain forecast, the participants were George, your author on his J70, Ronnie Ashmore sailing Ed Sherman's Etchells with Ed, VC John Barnard sailing his J22, and Curt Rubinstein sailing his Catalina 30. The selected course was starting at S20, turning at S6, and returning to an S20 finish. At the competitors' meeting, we decided to shorten after two hours if necessary – hoping to avoid the forecasted rain.

The race began in light wind and the three boats (Ultimate 24, J70, and Etchells) in front remained within a few boat lengths of one another for over an hour. These three boats have PHRF ratings within 10 seconds per mile of each other. After a drifting period and some shifts, the wind filled in at about 6 mph creating a tight reach. Unfortunately for the Etchells, the reach was too tight for a symmetrical spinnaker but the Ultimate 24 and J70 were powered up with their asymmetrical spinnakers. The race for first then came down to whether the J70 could hang close enough to the Ultimate for a lower corrected time. It was not to be. The race was euthanized with a shortened finish at S10 on the return. Almost immediately after the sport boats finished, it began to rain. Then it began to rain a lot. Following the race, we enjoyed beef stew and cold beverages around the clubhouse fireplace.

The Keelboat Fleet races 12 days per year, 6 days in a spring season from March to June and 6 days in a fall season from September to November. The initial spring and final fall race days are scheduled as distance events around government buoys. On the other days, 3 races around inflatable marks are scheduled with an intended duration of 45 minutes each. At 11:30 am, we have the competitors' meeting in the main parking lot and discuss the plans for the day. The warning signal for the first race is planned for 1:00 pm with the other two races following ASAP. No race will be started after 4:30 pm. After the races, we gather at the "Tiki Bar" at the head of D dock for snacks, refreshments (adult beverages provided and curated by the Fleet Beverage Consultant), and "stories."

Our fleet by-laws and sailing instructions can be found on the club website under "Club Documentation, Keelboat Fleet Documentation." We sail under US Sailing's Performance Handicap Racing Formula (PHRF) where inherently faster boats (based on boat design, not sailor skill) are handicapped against those that are not so inherently fast. We sail in two classes - "A" and "B" - with the "A Class" being those inherently faster with a PHRF rating of 189 or lower and the "B Class" boats having a rating of 190 or higher. Rating adjustments are made for sailing without a spinnaker if desired. Boats kept in the water receive a rating adjustment for that disadvantage too.

If you have any interest in racing, or just improving your sailing skills by comparing your performance with others, our fleet is a great way to get started. The racing is generally low-key with a minimum of "discussion" on the water. If you own a keelboat, come out on a race day and give it a try. If you like it, you can join later. "Cruisers" are welcome to participate and will be given their own start if they desire. If you have interest in crewing, contact me and I'll try to find you a ride.

DO YOU HAVE A DIRTY BOTTOM?

Even in our cool freshwater lake, aquatic organisms grow quickly on the bottom of a boat that remains in the water for extended periods. This growth effects performance dramatically, resulting in a slower, less responsive craft. These changes in performance are slow to occur and can go largely unnoticed, especially by non-racing sailors. Those who sail only in stronger winds will be even less likely to notice the increasingly shabby performance.

For those new to sailing, an encrusted, or even just slimy, bottom will make it much more difficult to learn to sail. Especially in light winds, a boat with a clean smooth bottom will quickly let a new sailor know when things are not being trimmed properly. Actually, being able to "feel" the responses of the boat to your input is extremely helpful to the novice or experienced sailor alike.

Spice up your life - Clean your dirty bottom!

The skipper in the January Windsong is still unknown. The Thistle is owned by Terhune Sudderth but Terhune informs me he was on the spinnaker, not the tiller, when the picture was taken. So only part of the mystery is solved. It is possible one of the

Spitz boys is at the tiller. In his early teens Terhune crewed for the club's first Rear Commodore, Morris Clayton, aboard Morris's Windmill. In addition to being postmaster in Laurens, Morris also surveyed property and Terhune, who occasionally assisted him, assisted in May of 1966 when Morris surveyed the two lots at the gate that Bob Stewart and Bill Rothfuss purchased and eventually transferred to the club. Terhune's father, Terhune "T" Sudderth, joined in May 1967 and served as club treasurer in 1969. A few years later, on September 29, 1976 Terhune joined and continues membership to this day. He was a junior instructor for the first Junior Sailing Camp in 1968 and he still enjoys supporting the junior sailing programs.

Morris Clayton sponsored my membership when I joined in July of 1970. That day marked a turning point in the lives of my family and me because it introduced unforgettable friendships and unparalleled adventures. Most weekends were spent at the club racing and enjoying social gatherings, and there were many sailing vacations. I partnered with Jim Gasque to purchase my first sailboat, a Lightning, from Tom Bates (Commodore 1968). Tom and Bill Sloger (Commodore 1971) became mentors to us, and our second Lightning was purchased from Bill Rothfuss (Commodore 1967).
