Recap The 2019 Dam Distance Race




"The wind on Lake Hartwell averages about 14; you get either 0 or 28."



Forecast on Monday



Forecast on Thursday




Forecast on Friday



Well, it's not so much how you start the race, it's how you finish. The forecast is just that, a forecast. The weather that would present on Saturday is what mattered. With no little amount of angst, we viewed the NWS forecast on race morning.

It looked like the final forecast was mid-teens with gusts to the mid 20's. More than some (like ME) enjoy, but maybe not too much for most of the fleet.

At that point, we had 22 boats registered for the event. At skipper's meeting, we had 19 skippers in attendance. This is about the time people decided how much fun they could stand (15 to 25, 55 degrees and 50% chance of rain), as only 15 boats left the harbor. To continue the process, 13 boats started the race and 11 boats completed the race.

On the bright side of all this weather stuff, the wind direction and strength

allowed race organizers to post a longer course than usual; the 2019 event raced to buoy 14 in the Big Water area of the lake, for a course distance of 12.2 miles. (Is this when I should mention the rain?)

This edition of the Dam Race is the first (in the last 6 years) that allowed the participation of dinghies. We were able to secure 2 volunteers (thanks Terhune and Dave) to man a safety boat. Unfortunately, only 2 dinghies registered, and one did not race (citing no crew and too much breeze for single handing). The one dinghy that did race still isn't sure if it was a good idea.

The delay clock (that's a pursuit-start thing) started about 11:15, and there were only a couple issues with starting too early. The race course was a beat from S 15 to S 10, and a beat to 26A TS. From there, to 21 was a close reach. The leg to 18 was a deeper reach, and the final (outbound) leg to 21 was a close reach. The return legs were a mixture of power reaches to dead downwind. Many boats sailed at (or above) hull speed. The first boat finished with a sailing time of 1 hour, 55 min. and 46 sec. The last boat to finished had a sailing time of 3 hours, 22 min, and 33 sec. Most commented that they had a good workout.

OK, now to the other part of the event: the After Party. All the while the racers were out doing battle with nature and their fellow competitors, the true heroes of this story (Ronnie and Jason) were grilling chicken, sausage appetizers, and baking the best EVER baked beans. We returned to a fire in the fireplace, Ronnie's music on the Club PA system, and that wonderful aroma of the grill. As the racers trickled in from putting their boats away (what's the expression-"Rode hard and put away wet"), cocktails began to appear and the story-telling began. "...Sail # 5336, you are over early... by a considerable margin". "I'm so glad the spin was in the bag when that cloud line dropped that BIG gust". "I'm not sure how fast I was going, I had my eyes closed".

Awards were, well, awarded about 17:45. Dinner was served immediately afterward. Rock and Roll (60's-70's) went on 'till about 20:00.

By all accounts, the 2019 Dam Distance Race went well-good attendance, plenty (ugh, yea) wind, terrific food, and lots of comradery sharing a great sailing experience. We hope to see you next year.
